Plenary Council

How many of these questions are being dealt with by the Plenary in Australia - or will they just feed us more platitudes?

Our Parish is planning to set up small Christian communities as part of our Plenary Council work.

Plenary Council faces huge problems in PROCESS (really listening to all voices) as well as CONTENT.

To everyone - get involved with your Plenary Council planning Group!!!

Let's hope we can take some of this wisdom through to the Plenary Council.

Praying for a mighty wind to carry this perspective to the hearts and ears of all the voting bishops at the Plenary Council.

Let us pray that all involved in the Plenary Council can 'see'

In Luke 7 Jesus said to the Pharisee, 'Simon, do you SEE this woman?'

Maybe we can begin by asking for a change to the time being given to the delegates to speak ~3 minutes is my understanding

Have all the women stand throughout the plenary council so even if they can't be heard, they can be seen. and talk for 3 mins and you have to send written intention to speak!

Plenary Council members

The voices in this webinar, the voices that are shut down, the voices advocating for a church that calls us to listen 'to the Jesus story' need to be heard and not shut down with petitions and social media vilification. Let's seize this moment to be truly a Church of the World.

Learnings and blessings

What resonates with me is the affirmation that we must act from our whole being. The hope I have for the Church is that change and the mystery of God is with us in powerful ways that I do not yet understand. My whole being is filled with hope and connection and I deeply hope that I can keep in touch with this dialogue. Why are we spending so much time trying to reform the Church when it is the spiritual perspective that needs to be reformed?

Hopeful and affirming expressions of the realities we need to face if we are to build that future [Church]. Inspires us to continue working where we know the needs are rather than adhering to the practices and rigidity of the Church of the past. Thank you, Joan and organisers,

Women

The women followed Jesus on the road to the Cross - Mary stood at the foot of the Cross - true discipleship. I've stood with other women and we wore black through a eucharist led by a bishop who would not allow women ministers of the Eucharist. Later we were accused of being divisive - my response was the Bishop was divisive - we were just making it visible.

Try a boycott.

Lots of insightful thoughts on the role of Women in the Church and its future are outlined in Getting Back on Mission.

Governance

The official response of our Bishops to the report, *The Light from the Southern Cross*, makes it clear, as did Archbishop Mark today, it's not just about "good management and governance" (M & G) but listening to the Spirit. That sounds like code for minimizing the importance of M & G. Yet our reality points to poor M & G as systemic weaknesses, central to many of the problems we decry or even encourage us to the exit. We have little idea just how the Spirit will get a hearing at our Council.

Thanks to Joan for a wonderful, prophetic address and congratulations to Peter Johnstone and his colleagues for setting up this important meeting. absolutely!

Young people

The young women that I teach have stopped asking these questions - they see the modern church as irrelevant to them.

To listen to our young people to their needs for many pronouns and recognition of our internal experience of gender - she he they them us

How do we open the hearts of the young so they see this 'new' Spirituality of the heart rather than their closed understanding of the spirituality of the past?

Allowing the young to help give shape to how we can participate in church is very important.

I would love to play this recording to my students - would this be allowed?

I wondered the same thing. I hope and pray for a church led by people with the wisdom and understanding of Sr Joan.

Questioning

Many of my friends have daughters that are questioning their place in the institution and they are leaving. My sons are the same - they can see the discrepancy and they do not like it It is a fear and question that many of my friends and I have.

Clergy

My parish priest is trying to ignore Vatican II altogether!

How can we embrace the clergy in our road to real renewal? How to avoid a "them" and us" division? This entire presentation should be listened to by all clergy in Australia and enact what is suggested We could start with an inclusive lectionary! And cease what one writer calls "the veneration of the ordained".

I wonder how many clergy are participating in this webinar, if any at all. Great thought!

Identity

There are massive questions about identity as a whole. In this new way of being Church, we also have to look at how we are, who we are and our place in this new way of being Church. An important dialogue to have about change - change management if you will!

Marginalised people

We all need to help the homeless - see StableOne.org

I keep thinking of First nations peoples of Australia. They are the poorest and most imprisoned in our country, crying out for an enshrined VOICE in our Constitution. What are our Parishes doing about supporting this?

Jesus reached out to the woman who was six times abandoned by men! An amazing insight!

Inclusion

Another group of people who are working for inclusion are those in interchurch and interfaith marriages, of which there are more than Catholic-Catholic in a number of countries. More can be found on this at http://interchurchfamilies.org

I am not a member of a church. I use Centering Prayer daily and follow the mystics readings on my own. How can the Church bring along those who have "left" the church?

When church leadership does speak up about change and use language of inclusivity, they get vilified. The loudest voice in our church in Australia at the moment seems to be from those who know 'the truth'. Very dualistic, no room for conversation and dialogue, hearing shared wisdom.

Synodality
