Let us pray

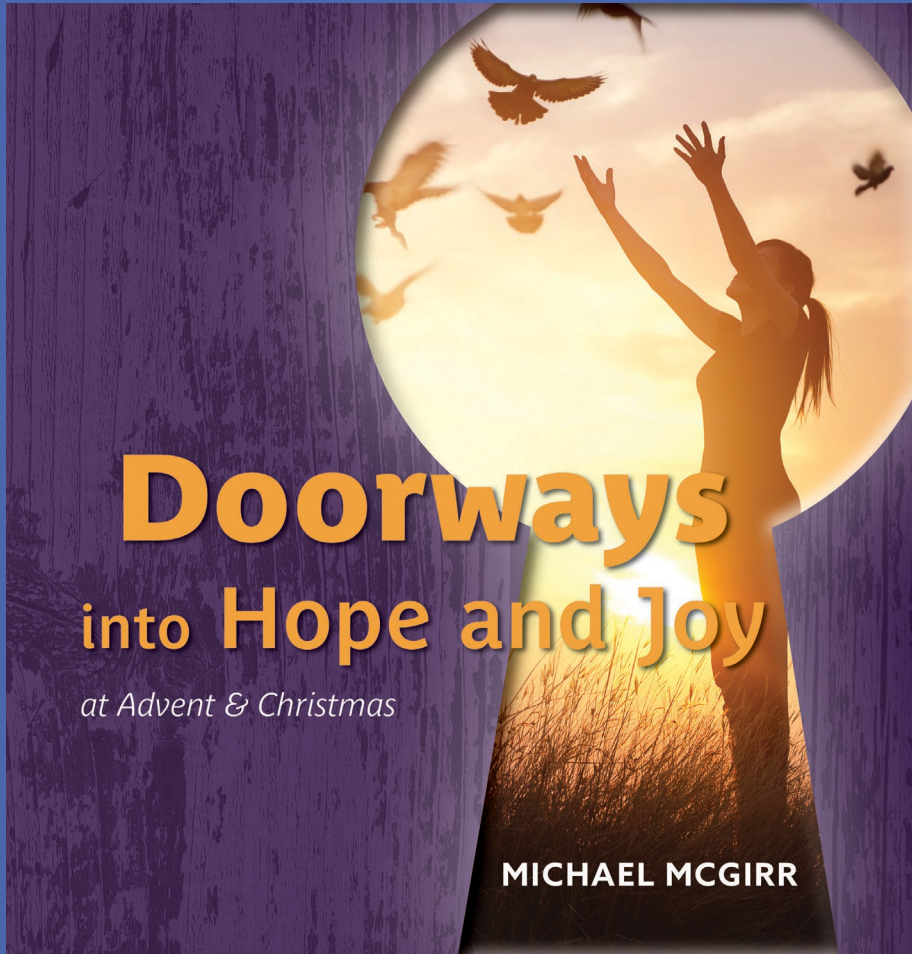
Your love is better than life itself.
