For Teachers and Parents

Teamwork is centred around the concept of building teamwork in the classroom, year level, school group, home and beyond. It would be worthwhile sharing this with specialist teachers, to ensure consistent language is used and also to gain their ideas and input.

For Teachers

This set of readers is designed to complement class reading capabilities. It can be used as a supplementary resource for literacy and for understanding Religious Education concepts in conjunction with the *MJR* resource, *My Friend Jesus*.

These books are aimed at Emergent and Early Readers in Years 1 and 2, and for reluctant readers in other year levels. They are not formally levelled with the aim of allowing students to be flexible in their reading abilities and interest. *MJR* readers can be used to help support wellbeing concepts covered in the classroom and help to facilitate communication between home and school.

For Parents and Carers

How you can help at home:

1. Read the book aloud together with your child. Familiarise yourself with *My Friend Jesus* if you have it.
2. Encourage your child to read the book independently.
3. Use the photos to help your child work out concepts discussed. Encourage them to tell the story through the photos. For example, what is [fill in]... doing? Why do you think [fill in]? What do you think is the right thing to do? What would Jesus do? Why do you think that?
4. Read the book several times and engage in conversation with other family members.
