Objectives

Participants will...

- recognize the RCIA as an opportunity to ask questions about God, faith, and the Catholic Church.
- recall the origin and periods of the RCIA process.
- interpret the RCIA as Jesus' invitation to join the Church.

Leader Meditation

Psalm 139:1-16

Reflect on your faith journey—if possible, before the Blessed Sacrament—considering the many times God has protected and guided you. He has brought you to this moment and has led and entrusted each inquirer to your care. Ponder this great trust, this opportunity to be their companion and guide. Pray for wisdom and courage. Rely on the Lord's help. He will lead you as you lead them.

Leader Preparation

- Read the lesson handout, this lesson plan, the opening Scripture passage, and the Catechism sections.
- Read the front sections of this leader guide. The USCCB website may also help you explain the RCIA and Catechism further.
- Be familiar with the vocabulary terms in this lesson: RCIA, rites, catechist, inquiry, catechumen(ate), godparent, sponsor, purification and enlightenment, sacraments of initiation, mystagogy, catechism. Definitions can be found in this guide's glossary.
- Obtain copies of the New American Bible (or other Catholic translation) and Catechism for each participant as well as any required materials listed earlier in this guide on page 15. Enlist creative ways to supply prayer journals and other unique items (see activity below and "Integrating the Parish Community" above).
- Gather copies of your parish's RCIA calendar or a list of key event dates for each participant.

Welcome

As the group gathers, welcome each individual, repeating back names. Direct participants to the supplies, nametags, refreshments, and restrooms. Take some time for introductions. (The activity at the end of the lesson is a good ice breaker that can be used at the beginning or the end of the session.) After giving initial instructions and announcements, take questions and respond briefly. Begin promptly.

Opening Scripture

Psalm 139:1-16

Read the passage aloud from a Catholic Bible or study *Lectionary*. Allow for a moment of silence, and then ask for comments or reactions to the words. Finally, share a few words of encouragement and affirmation. Indicate that God is leading them and has been with them their whole lives.

Light the candle and explain that it is a sign and reminder of the Lord's presence. Jesus said, "I am the light of the world" and "where two or three are gathered together in my name, there am I in the midst of them" (John 8:12 and 9:5; Matthew 18:20). Begin with this prayer:

Heavenly Father, through the gift of your Son and the power of your Holy Spirit, we ask you to guide us in our faith journey. Help us to hear your voice and to follow where you lead. And give us your peace. Amen.

What Does the RCIA Mean?

The RCIA stands for the Rite of Christian **Initiation of Adults**. It's the process through which unbaptized adults and older children are formed in the teachings and practices of Catholicism and are initiated into the Catholic Church. It's marked by various **rites** or rituals, which usually occur at Sunday Mass. Sometimes the process includes baptized adult Christians or Catholics who are preparing to receive the sacraments of confirmation and Eucharist.

Why Do Catholics Initiate Others Into Their Faith?

Jesus told his followers to "make disciples of all nations" (Matthew 28:19). No other ancient religion sought converts: not Egyptians, Greeks, or Romans. But Christians-not just Catholicsstill welcome and invite anyone to join us.

Before moving forward with your lesson, ask if any inquirer is unfamiliar with the Bible. Briefly review its organization before you begin (see Q5: The Bible). Distinguish between the Old and New Testaments but emphasize the importance of each and their unity as the inspired word of God. The Old Testament, or Hebrew Scriptures, covers the beginning of salvation history within and through the Hebrews' (or Israelites') covenant relationship with God. The New Testament covers the fulfillment of salvation history in and through Jesus' life, death, and resurrection and includes teachings and letters from the early Christian Church.

Welcome to the RCIA

Start the discussion with general questions about what brought everyone to the group today. Such

- Is anyone here with a family member or friend?
- Do you know a parishioner here?
- How were you introduced to the Catholic faith and our RCIA process?

Take Your Time

Read the questions in the lesson together and invite participants to respond to each one. This will deepen the group's knowledge of each other's backgrounds and perspectives. It will also help the team members and sponsors to form a sense of each participant's needs.

Sometimes the process includes baptized adult Christians or Catholics who are preparing to receive the sacraments of confirmation and Eucharist.

Why Do Catholics Initiate Others Into Their Faith?

Jesus told his followers to "make disciples of all nations" (Matthew 28:19). No other ancient religion sought converts: not Egyptians, Greeks, or Romans. But Christians—not just Catholics still welcome and invite anyone to join us. This is because we believe that:

- Following Jesus makes people happier and more at peace, both here and in the life to come. We believe the Catholic Church has the fullest and most authentic understanding of Jesus.
- The Christian community is strengthened by the conversion of all people, who are created in God's likeness and called to discipleship.

"I came so that they might have life and have it more abundantly."

John 10:10

"I have told you this so that my joy may be in you and your joy may be complete."

John 15:11

Jesus Says, "Come!"

Jesus doesn't just want us to follow him into the faith blindly. He wants us to make the choice freely and with all the information we need to make a decision.

- "Come, and you will see" (John 1:39).
 Jesus invites people to observe him to see if he accomplishes what he says. You will study Jesus closely in the RCIA.
- "Come after me" (Matthew 4:19). These are some of the first words Jesus spoke during his ministry. He didn't say, "Understand me" or, "Obey me." He allowed people to consider his ways and to freely make up their minds.
- "Come, follow me" (Mark 10:21; Luke 18:22). "Follow me" is perhaps the simplest definition of our faith. The RCIA is like a winding road: hard to see far down, but revealed as you go. Fortunately, Jesus leads the way.

What Happens in the RCIA?

Most processes are a series of weekly sessions with a team of **catechists** (religion teachers), sponsors, and fellow participants. Each session is a safe place to discuss the faith and explore questions about Catholicism or religion and spirituality in general. All questions are welcome and honored.

God invited Mary to be the mother of Jesus because Jesus couldn't be born without her free and informed consent. Before giving her consent, Mary asked "How can this be?" (Luke 1:34). Like Mary, we all have free will to accept Jesus into our lives and to ask our questions. That's how much God respects—and even expects—your honest questions.

Is the RCIA New?


This process began in the earliest years of the Church. In those first centuries, it was a challenge to convert to Christianity because the Roman Empire often persecuted those who didn't follow its pagan religion. The Church wanted to make sure that candidates really knew what they were doing and were willing to stand up for their faith in a hostile environment. In the 1960s, the Church called for a return to this early model in order to provide Christian formation in the same gradual way people experience and enter any lasting and loving relationship.



How Long Does the RCIA Last?

Q1: Welcome to the RCIA!

Catechism: 1229-1249

Objectives

- Identify the RCIA as a time to ask questions about the Catholic faith.
- Differentiate between the four periods of the RCIA process.
- Describe the origins of the RCIA.
- Engage in thoughtful spiritual reflection.

Leader Meditation

Psalm 139:1-16

Think about your own faith journey. Consider the many times God has protected and guided you. Now, consider the ones this same God is guiding and entrusting to your care. Imagine the trust God has in you. You have been given the opportunity to be their companion and guide on their faith journey. Pray for wisdom and courage. Rely on the Lord's help.

Leader Preparation

- Read the lesson handout, this lesson plan, the Scripture passage, and Catechism sections.
- Read the front sections of this Leader Guide. The USCCB website may also help you explain the RCIA and Catechism further.
- Gather copies of the New American Bible and Catechism for each participant as well as any required materials listed earlier in this guide under "Materials and Supplies." Enlist creative ways to supply prayer journals and other unique items (see "Integrating the Parish Community").
- Be familiar with the vocabulary terms for this lesson: RCIA, catechist, catechumenate, godparent, sponsor, sacraments of initiation, mystagogy, scrutinies, catechism. Definitions can be found in this guide's glossary.

Welcome

As participants arrive, welcome each individual, repeating back each name. Direct participants to the supplies, nametags, refreshments, and restrooms. Take time for group introductions. After giving initial instructions and announcements, take questions and respond briefly. Begin promptly.

Opening Scripture

Psalm 139:1-16

If any inquirer is unfamiliar with the Bible, briefly review its organization and how to look up readings before you begin. Light the candle and explain that it is a sign and a reminder of the Lord's presence.

Ask for a volunteer to read aloud. Afterward, allow a moment of silence, and then welcome reactions to the words. Share a few words of encouragement and affirmation. Let the participants know that God is leading them and has been with them from the beginning. Before you go into the discussion of the lesson, ask participants to think about all the things that happened to bring them here to the RCIA.

Welcome to the RCIA

- For today's lesson, start with the activity at the end of the participant handout (see "Activity" section of this lesson plan for instructions). This will help the group get to know each other and enable participants to open up and participate in a low-pressure way as you get started.
- Give participants a short overview of what will happen in their RCIA classes. You'll explain each period in more detail later, so keep your overview informal and focused on what participants can expect each time they meet.

Jesus doesn't just ask us to follow him into the faith blindly. He wants us to make the choice freely and with all the information we need to make a decision. We can see examples of this in Scripture:

"Come, and you will see!"

John 1:39

Jesus invites people to observe him closely over time to see if he accomplishes what he says he will. We will observe Jesus closely during these RCIA sessions.

"Come after me."

Matthew 4:19

These three words are the simplest definition of our faith. In fact, they are the first words Jesus spoke when he began his ministry. Notice he didn't say, "Understand me" or even, "Believe in me." He simply asked people to observe him closely and then freely choose on their own to follow in his footsteps.

Why Do We Have an RCIA Program?

Jesus asked those first Christians to "go, therefore, and make disciples of all nations..." (Matthew 28:19). Christians made disciples because they believed that following Jesus would make others happier and more at peace. We believe the Catholic understanding of Jesus' teachings is the fullest and most authentic understanding of Jesus. Your RCIA classes will be led by a **catechist**, someone who teaches the principles of the Christian religion to others.

What Does the RCIA Mean?

The letters stand for **Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults**. It is the learning program for people to become *initiated* or *enter* the Catholic Church. It also includes *rites*, or rituals, usually done at Sunday Mass (see lesson C1).

Its main purpose is to help those who are interested in becoming Catholic do so or to help those who want to receive **sacraments** like Communion or confirmation that they missed earlier in life but would like to receive now. (More on the sacraments in later lessons.)

Is This a New Process?


This learning program began in the earliest years of the Church. Christians then knew it was hard to convert to Christianity because the Roman Empire persecuted Christians. The Church wanted to make sure that candidates really knew what they were getting into and that they were willing to stand up for their faith in a sometimes hostile pagan environment. In the mid-twentieth century, the Church decided to return to this process by offering solid Christian education in the same gradual manner that people enter any lasting and loving relationship.

What Happens in the RCIA?

Most RCIA programs involve a series of weekly sessions with a team of teachers, sponsors, and fellow candidates.

Each session is a safe place for you to hear about our faith and to ask questions about Catholicism or faith in general. If the team leaders do not know the answer to a question, they will research it and get back to you with a response. All questions are welcomed and honored.

Go Ahead and Ask: Mary questions God when she's told she's going to be the mother of Jesus (Luke 1:34). God answers because Jesus could not be born without her free and informed consent. That is how much God respects and even expects your honest questions.





Catechism: 1229-49

Objectives

- Describe the RCIA as a time to ask questions about the faith.
- List the four phases, or periods, of the RCIA.
- Identify the RCIA as rooted in early Christian history.

Leader Meditation

Psalm 139:1-16

Think about your own faith journey. Consider the many times God has protected and guided you. Now, consider the ones this same God has entrusted to your care. Imagine the trust God has in you. You have been given the opportunity to be their companion and guide on their faith journey. Pray for wisdom and courage. Rely on the Lord's help.

Leader Preparation

- Read the lesson handout, this lesson plan, the Scripture passage, and the Catechism sections.
- Read the front sections of this Leader Guide. Publications on usccb.org may also help you explain the RCIA and the Catechism further.
- Gather copies of the New American Bible and the Catechism for each participant as well as any required materials. Enlist creative ways to supply prayer journals and other unique items.
- Be familiar with the vocabulary terms for this lesson: catechist, Catechism of the Catholic Church, Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults, rite, initiation, catechumen, candidate, inquiry, catechumenate, godparent, sponsor, purification and enlightenment, sacraments of initiation, sacraments, baptism, Communion, confirmation, mystagogy. Definitions can be found in this guide's glossary.

Welcome

Greet the children as they arrive. Check for supplies and immediate needs. Solicit questions or comments about the previous lesson and/or share new information and findings. Begin promptly.

Opening Scripture

Psalm 139:1-16

If any of the children in your group are unfamiliar with the Bible, briefly review its organization and how to look up readings before you begin (you will probably have to do this multiple times before the children get familiar with how to do it). Light the candle and explain that it is a sign and a reminder of the Lord's presence.

After reading the selection, ask the children what the Psalm made them think of as they were listening to it. Share a few words of encouragement and affirmation. Let the children know that God is leading them and has been with them from the beginning.



Why are you in RCIA today?



Mr. Evans continued. "Mrs. Evans and I are your catechists. A catechist is someone who teaches you about religion using a book called a catechism. We'll use a book called the **Catechism of the Catholic Church** since you're here to

Evans held up a huge book.

"We're not going to have to learn all that, are we?" Terrence asked. He looked shocked.

"No," Mr. Evans said, laughing. "That would be a lot! This class is just the beginning."

"Are these classes just for kids?" Tanya asked.

"Yes and no," said Mrs. Evans. "These classes are just for you. The process you're going through is for kids your age, teenagers, and adults. It's called the Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults, or RCIA for short."

Lisa frowned and said, "But we're not adults."
