Of course, none of these stories think that the doors should remain locked and bolted. They show us creative ways to get them open.

Faith is always a foot in the door, stopping us from getting closed in on ourselves. It is a key to the safe in which we can be tempted to keep our hearts, fearing they might get hurt yet again.

Please enjoy these doors and find a few minutes for the Lord who stands and knocks, patiently. Jesus says to those he advises to keep ringing his doorbell 'What parent, when a child asks for bread, will give them a stone?'

Please also enjoy the twelve cards of Christmas. The Lord finds a way into our wallets, purses, bags, letter-boxes and drawers. Amid all the hassles that can come with the end of one year and beginning of another, remember that God has seen more years than the rest of us combined. In the enormous expanse of the universe, God knows the beauty of small gestures. In the vast ocean of time, God can touch us in a moment.
